While sitting in a park on a children's slide and eating Mexican food, Jack Dorsey introduces the idea of using an SMS service to communicate with a small group.

2006

Developers initially consider "10958" as an SMS short code, but later change it to "40404" for "ease of use and memorability."

2006

Twitter is originally called twttr inspired by Flickr and the five character length of American SMS short codes.

March 21, 2006, 9:50 PM Pacific Standard Time (PST)

Jack Dorsey publishes the first Twitter message

July 15, 2006



Twitter is an online social networking service and microblogging service that enables its users to send and read text-based messages of up to 140 characters, known as "**tweets**".

It was created in March 2006 by Jack Dorsey and launched that July. The service rapidly gained worldwide popularity, with over 500 million active users as of 2012, generating over 340 million tweets daily and handling over 1.6 billion search queries per day.^{[6][8][9]} Since its launch, Twitter has become one of the top 10 most visited websites on the Internet, and has been described as "the SMS of the Internet."^{[5][10]} Unregistered users can read tweets, while registered users can post tweets through the website interface, SMS, or a range of apps for mobile devices.^[11]

Concluding Benefits of Twitter

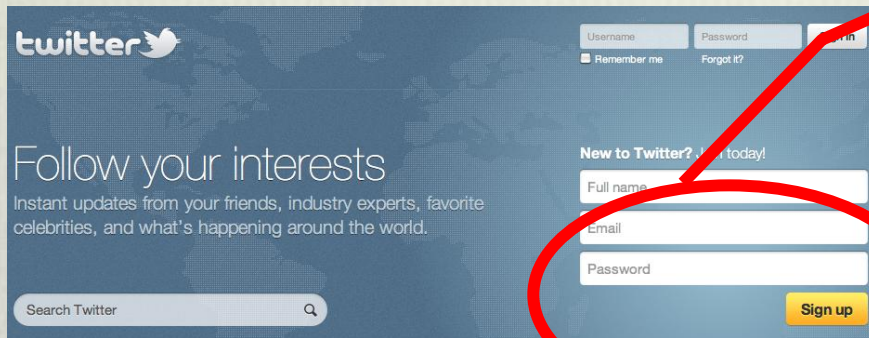
- ❖ Twitter is a powerful tool for educators

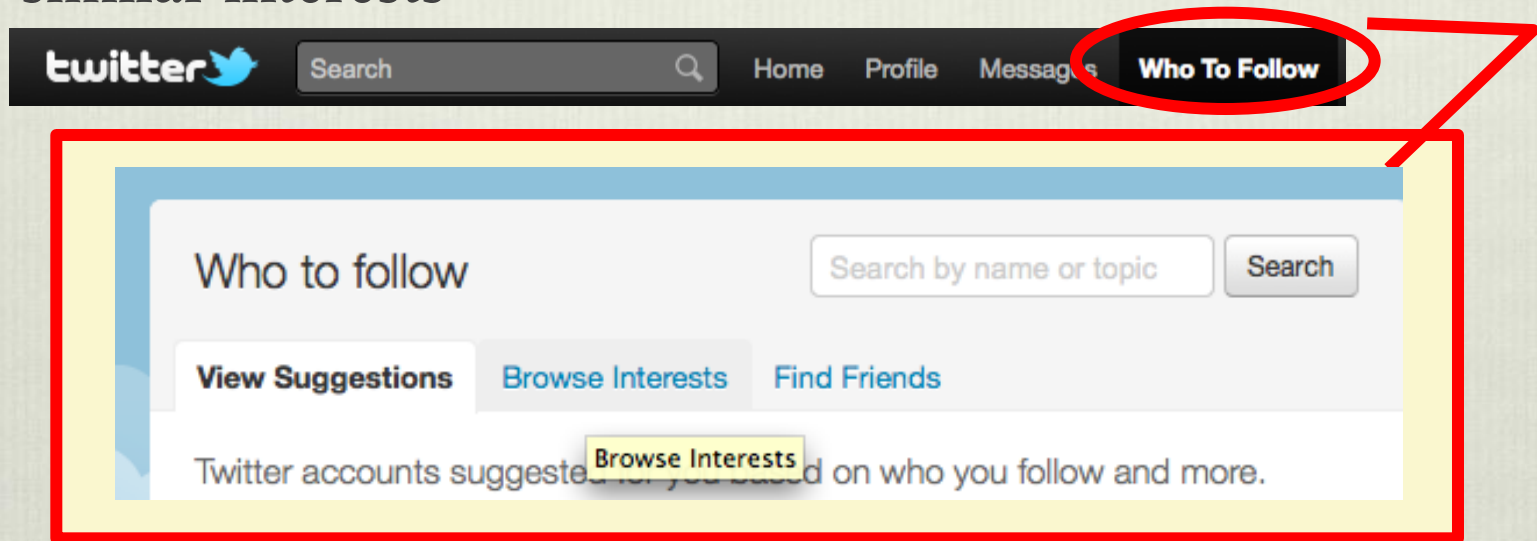

Find People

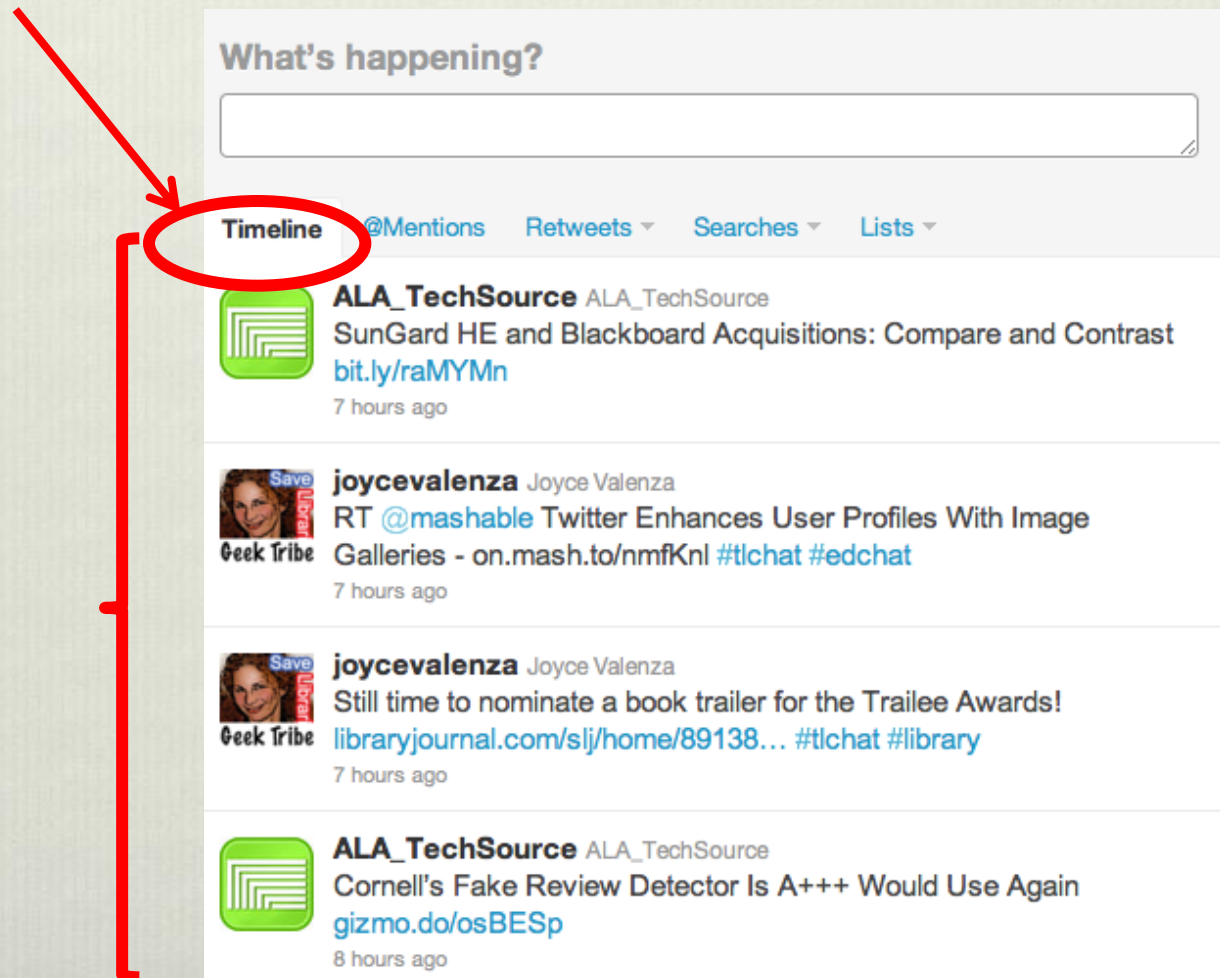
- ❖ Use the “Who to Follow” search features to find people with similar interests



- ❖ Search for people that you already read (journal articles, blogs, etc.)
 - ❖ Look at beginning & end of articles for authors' twitter accounts:
 - ❖ @kathyschrock (@ preceding a username = a person / company to follow on Twitter)
- ❖ Find on a list
- ❖ See at an educational conference

Building Your PLN

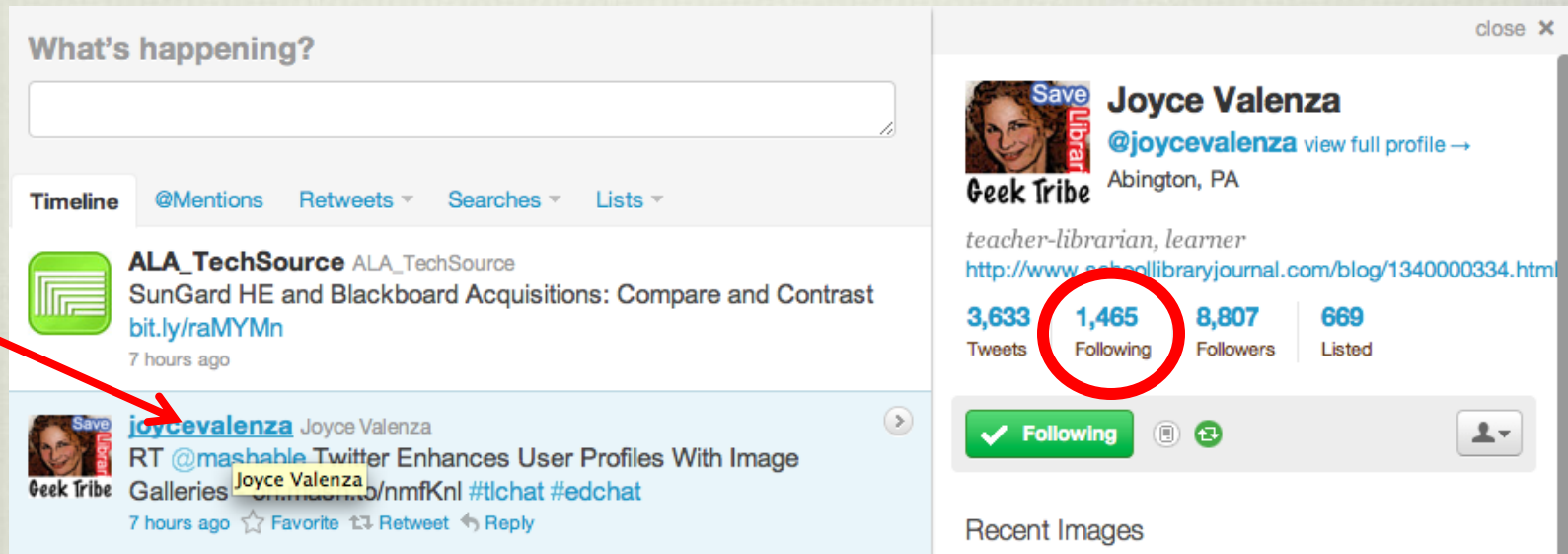
- ❖ Begin receiving tips & resource links within your own Twitter “feed” or “timeline”:



Continue to build:

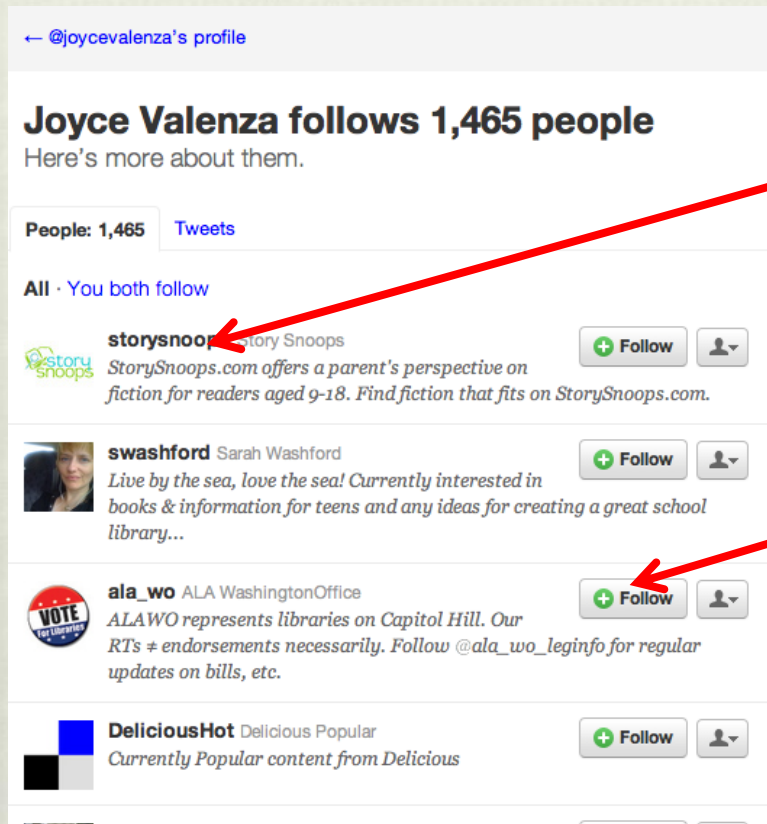
- ❖ Once you follow an expert – can then click on a list to see who that person **follows**
- ❖ View the items these others are posting
- ❖ Choose to follow those people as well
- ❖ And so on, and so on...

1) Click a person's name



2) Profile info appears

Continue to build:



3) Click a person's name in this list for more info & to see tweets

4) Click the "Follow" button to include this person in your PLN

- ❖ Can also click on a list of users who are **following** this person you respect
 - ❖ Possibly find others to add to your PLN by following **them**

PLN Grows

- ❖ After adding new people, check to see if others you follow also follow new, interesting people
- ❖ Once a large PLN is built up with educational experts
 - ❖ Some might be specific to your field
 - ❖ Science expert
 - ❖ Some might be more general pedagogy
 - ❖ Tony Wagner
 - ❖ Some might be from a related field
 - ❖ Educational Technology – David Warlick or Alan November

Weed Your PLN

- ❖ If you follow many of those people that follow the people you like, your network will become very large rather quickly
- ❖ Winnow down the list to those that really provide valuable resources
 - ❖ Frequency: do they tweet often? Or only rarely?
 - ❖ Content: valuable resources, interesting articles, user generated content? Or useless info, personal data (CheckIns), etc.?

Click your “Following” button to view members of your PLN



Click a person’s “Following” button to “Un-Follow” this person & remove him/her from your PLN

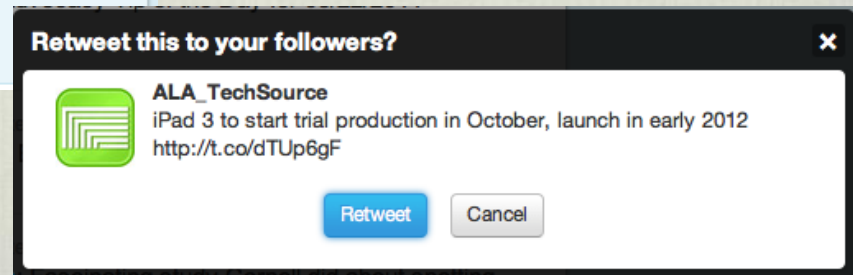


Fertilize Your PLN

- ❖ Important to “give back” to the education community by posting your own discoveries & finds
 - ❖ Easily done via Twitter
- ❖ Creating an account and following others is not enough
 - ❖ Post responses to other people's messages
 - ❖ Retweet useful tweets from those YOU follow
 - ❖ When people start to follow YOU, they will not receive the same tweets as you – important to spread the information
